A Message from Your President Terry Miller

Greetings, gardening friends!

As I am writing this, remnants of snow cover my flower beds, but the snowdrops have already begun to emerge. It will come, but I always love an early Spring, and there is nothing like an extended growing season.

It will be "all hands on deck" again for collecting and potting perennials for the big day, not to mention the intense preparation week beginning May 5^{th} . 
Backyard Wilderness: A Film Screening and Panel Discussion Thursday, April 3, 2025 | 7 p.m.

This tool has an inverted V blade with root-cutting ripsaw teeth that slice through sod and roots with ease. My husband used this tool to edge a new flower bed and he said it is the best garden tool he ever used and made the job so easy. The tool cuts through turf like a warm knife through butter. You can buy it on Amazon and the purchase is well worth it.

Snippit about the Meeting House MJ Schlomann

The stone walls surrounding the burial ground were in poor condition when the Downingtown Friends deeded that property to the Trust in 2019. The walls were repaired in several stages from 2020-2024. The top slabs were adhered and sealed, protecting the walls from water damage, and the sections that had fallen stones were rebuilt at a cost of \$15,350. One question arose—when were the walls built?

I found a paper that was read to the Grange by Isaac Smedley in 1939, and I learned that in 1771, Isaac Lewis and David Owen left legacies to build a wall around the graveyard. Other gifts of land and money followed, and the wall was started in 1772 and finished in 1775. So now, we know!







Horticulture Therapy & Little Sprouts Kate Morrison

In December, we hosted a horticulture therapy program for assisted living and memory care residents. Using greens from the Christmas sale, along with florals, sticks, and decorative embellishments, residents created festive arrangements in Christmas mugs. As we get older (wink, wink), we need special tools and helpers in the garden. If your lot is fairly level, a must have is a 'Foldable Garden Kneeler and Seat.' With it in the up-position, you can sit; flip it over and you can kneel on a padded surface with "arms' to help you stand up. When you are finished working for the day, the 'arms' or 'legs' fold flat for storage. I don't recommend it for hilly terrain, because you can topple over! 
