#### 2026 Pennsylvania Garden Party

Pennsylvania is hosting a Garden Party! One of GCFP President Pat Wolanski's initiatives is to show off our beautiful state by planning a statewide garden tour.

Garden clubs across PA are invited to participate by showcasing 6 - 7 show worthy gardens in their area. Twenty-five dollars buys a tour booklet and a ticket to visit gardens on both Saturday, June 20 and Saturday, June 27, 2026, from 9:30 until 4:00. That is fourteen gardens to experience for this rain or shine event.

It is estimated that 100 beautiful gardens will be open for visitors across the state of Pennsylvania. There will be various kinds of gardens offered such as pollinator, specialty plants/flowers, Old English, vegetable, rock, native, and many more.

Uwchlan Garden Club is 'joining the party' and is currently securing the seven gardens to be on display on Saturday, June 27, 2026. Hostesses will be needed to serve in shifts at the gardens on this day. Pam Walsh is our Club Liaison for the event. On Saturday, June 20, 2026, Uwchlan Garden Club members can use their ticket to visit the gardens of neighboring clubs or districts.

GCFP is offering an 80/20 ticket sales split. For every \$25 ticket sold, our club will receive \$20. If we sell 50 tickets, we can earn \$1,000. One hundred tickets gets us \$2,000! The club that sells the most tickets in the state will receive an award of \$1,000 for first place, \$750 for 2<sup>nd</sup> place, and \$500 for 3<sup>rd</sup> place.

In addition, our club needs to solicit ads from local businesses, eateries, garden centers, etc. The club with the highest ad revenue will win \$1,000. Second place will receive \$750, and  $3^{rd}$  place will earn \$500. Kate Teeter-Morrison is our Club Ad Coordinator.

This is a generous offer from our federation and an incredible opportunity to boost our treasury and increase our presence in the community. So, find your place in making our club tour a huge success.

Next month, we'll be switching out the summer plants for fall favorites. If you'd like to help with this community outreach project, please reach out— we'd love to have you join us!





## Snippits About the Meeting House Musings of Peggy Hartwick

Our parent organization, The Woman's Community Club of Uwchlan, felt Lionville was a nice place to call 'home' and set the wheels in motion to purchase the Uwchlan Meeting House from the Uwchlan Grange. The building was in total disrepair when this was finalized in 1963. Never described as shrinking violets, these energetic women had varied backgrounds but were united in determination. Most were equally involved in both the Woman's Club and the Garden Class. Many served on boards of both federations, and all worked tirelessly on fundraisers and projects.

A four-phase renovation plan was drawn up, and Phase I was completed -construction of the 'west wing', plumbing, a heating system, and a fully equipped kitchen where a porch had been. Members were also responsible for getting the building placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1973. Old records tell us that the notification letter arrived just before bulldozers started work to create a cloverleaf on Route 113 onto the meeting house grounds, and the highway department packed up all their equipment and left!

Realizing that the eighty members could not raise enough funds to complete all the renovations, the Uwchlan Conservation Trust (UCT) was formed, and the meeting house was sold to the UCT in 1976. Phase II included restoring the original four chimneys and putting on a new roof; Phase III included removal of a Victorian porch that had been added about 1875, repointing all the exterior stonework, and restoring the facade as much as possible to its original appearance. Phase IV was the restoration of the interior of the building. Community donations, federal and charitable trust grants, and money raised by the WCCU Christmas Fair and Garden Class Plant Sale funded the last three restoration phases.

Today, the 1756 Uwchlan Meeting House stands proudly on its original site!

### Pruning Hydrangeas Proven Winners & MJ Schlomann

#### Pruning Based on Type:

- Hydrangeas that bloom on old wood ( Oakleaf Hydrangeas, Bigleaf Hydrangeas that are not rebloomers, Mountain Hydrangeas that are not rebloomers)
  Most shrubs that bloom on old wood should be pruned immediately after they are done flowering. However, hydrangeas that bloom on old wood finish flowering so late in the season that pruning them after they bloom doesn't leave enough time for them to regrow and form flower buds for next year. Proven Winners suggests that you avoid pruning this type of hydrangea except to remove any completely dead branches in the spring once the plant starts to leaf out.
- Hydrangeas that bloom on new wood (Smooth Hydrangeas, Panicle Hydrangeas)
   These can be safely pruned in late fall once the plants have gone dormant or in early spring. Next year's flower buds won't be formed until late spring the same year they bloom, so there is no risk of removing the buds if you prune in fall or spring.
- Reblooming hydrangeas (Reblooming varieties of Bigleaf Hydrangeas & Mountain Hydrangeas)

Reblooming hydrangeas produce flowers on both old and new wood. Reblooming cultivars should be pruned the same way as hydrangeas that bloom on old wood, meaning you should only need to prune out a few (if any) dead branches in the spring once the plant starts to leaf out.

#### How Much to Prune

- Generally, it is safe to prune as much as one-third off hydrangeas that boom on new wood. Pruning it further removes too much of the sturday framework that keeps the plant standing upright.
- Make your cut just above a set of large, healthy leaves.
- If in doubt, DON'T PRUNE! No hydrangea requires pruning to grow and bloom well.

## 'GCFP Reads' Opportunities Sharon Richardson



# Showcase Your Blooms: Enter the Greater Philadelphia Dahlia Society Show at Longwood Gardens Sharon Richardson

A big thank you to Program Chair, Carol McConnell, for giving us the chance to learn about growing dahlias, and to Jeff Dore, one of our speakers last spring, who generously provided many of you with dahlia tubers.

If you're interested in showcasing your beautiful dahlias, why not enter them in the Greater Philadelphia Dahlia Show held on September 20-21 at Longwood Gardens? You can submit entries on September 20 from 6 - 10 a.m. Entering a dahlia show is similar to entering an NGC Flower Show, but there are a few important differences to keep in mind:

- 1. **Containers Provided:** The Dahlia Society supplies all containers for the show, so be sure to transport your dahlias carefully and transfer them into the provided containers upon arrival.
- 2. Entry Cards: Unlike standard flower show entry cards, the dahlia entry cards ask for details like the size, form, and color of each bloom. Be sure to include this information on each card. To get more familiar with this, check out this 2-minute video: <u>Dahlia Show Entry Basics</u>.
- 3. **4-Digit Code:** Each dahlia is assigned a 4-digit number code that represents its size, form, and color. You can find these codes in Dahlia Classification books available at check-in.
- 4. Helpful Assistance: Experienced Dahlia Society members will be available to help you with your entry cards. However, it's a good idea to come prepared with the name of your dahlia, along with its size and form. With that info, they can assist you in finding the correct 4-digit code. Here's an article with helpful charts on size, form, and color: <u>Dahlia Types Guide</u>.
- 5. Small Growers Division: If you're new to growing dahlias, consider entering Division 4, which is specifically for "Small Growers." Be sure to request Small Grower entry cards. A Small Grower is someone who grows dahlias for personal enjoyment, does not sell them for profit, has never been employed as a gardener, and grows fewer than 75 dahlias.




